

The Surprise of Change

Bo and I celebrated our 37th anniversary on May 23. We have certainly seen many changes during our marriage. Some we knew were coming and others were a complete surprise. Some changes had signs that they were coming and still surprised

Our engagement surprised my father. Bo, being the southern gentleman, wanted to ask my father to marry me. We drove to my parent's home and after dinner Bo talked to my dad about how much he loved me. They discussed the importance of marriage and the commitment it takes, and how marriage helps each partner become the best version of themselves. Bo told him that we wanted to get married after we graduated from Annapolis. Dad listened and affirmed what Bo said. But, at the end when Bo said, "Would you like to see the ring?" Dad replied with shock: "Ring? What ring?" Even though all the conversation pointed to engagement and marriage, the reality of it still caught my father off guard. We got engaged that day and have been journeying together ever since.

We would often tease Dad about that day. Yet, changes catch most of us by surprise, even when we see the signs. Epworth has undergone many changes over the past fifteen years. We moved from one location to another. We have had pastoral changes and lay leadership changes. We have had members leave and new members join. Of course, the pandemic brought many changes, including significant financial changes, and we still cannot fully grasp all the implications. And The United Methodist Church is undergoing a major transformation with many churches disaffiliating and the remaining churches revisioning the future.

Our Source Collaborative Team recognizes that the three initiatives we have proposed (a Learning Center @Epworth, Youth and Families @Epworth, and Online Community @Epworth) will bring both energy and excitement even while requiring change in our church. We will need to change to become more interdependent on one another, no longer doing ministry in a vacuum, but acknowledging the other ministries and how we all work together. Epworth needs some systemic change, too, reviewing and reworking policies and procedures to ensure that our congregation thrives. We hope that these changes will bring new growth, and new people will bring new ideas and change to our congregation.

We have spent this past year in worship focusing on transformation, to help us process all these changes. We laid out a transformational model: Regular Reflection will lead to Interdependence and Systemic Change which will bring about Bridge-Building and expand our Inclusivity. We explored the Case for Change and Preparing for Change. We spent time understanding the Emotions of Change and Practices which Change.

Recently we announced some staffing changes. Working with SPRC and our Governing Board Chair, we examined duplication of tasks as well as which ones could be filled with volunteers. As a result, we eliminated the custodian position. Our Facilities Manager will pick up most of those tasks as well as volunteers. We changed our Office Manager position to Finance Manager and reduced the hours from 40 to 20. We reduced the hours of our Special Projects Assistant, from 25 to eight, and changed the focus of that role to Building Rental only. And we reduced our Administrative Assistant from 11 hours to eight. As a staff and a congregation, we will need to live into these changes, training volunteers and working together to accomplish the work that still needs to be done.

Therefore, we need your help as we transition. We need your patience, grace, and flexibility as we learn new ways of being. We need you to volunteer your time and pitch in when you see a task that needs doing. I also ask you to refrain from gossip, which only tears down our body and eventually hurts everyone.

I also ask you to allow yourself to grieve the changes. You might feel afraid, or angry, or sad about the changes. Recognize that these emotions are a normal part of grief and change. When you recognize these emotions in yourself, try not to take them out on others. When you see others experiencing these emotions, be gentle and patient with them.

Above all, I invite us all into a deep trust of God's love, which never changes. Everything around us may change. But God's love remains steadfast. As we trust in that love, we remain open to the new creation God is making out of us. Take a moment the next time you see the sanctuary and look up at the cross. Murray has been using hearts to create a sense of movement and change. By the time you read this article, he will have transformed the hearts into a butterfly. What a beautiful metaphor of new life and growth and change! Let's hold onto one another and trust in the depth of God's love to lead us into the future unafraid.



Pastor Bo's Views



Faith thrives at Epworth through our online congregation

Bishop Johnson appointed me as Associate Pastor at Epworth in July 2020, several months after the Covid quarantine necessitated all-online worship – for the next year! During those months, we experimented with ways to meet virtually for fellowship, study, and service to others during the week, as well as ways to worship, share communion, and sing every Sunday. We all learned new technology (how to unmute ourselves on Zoom! or open a rip-and-sip communion cup) and different ways of celebrating and grieving together. Both of our children were married in intimate Covid quarantine ceremonies (my parents and brothers watched on <u>Facebook</u>), and we held a socially-distanced funeral for Vicki's mother. We worshipped in person on Saturday evenings in our parking lot.

When the quarantine lifted in 2021, everything refused to go back to normal again (there's no place like home; there's no place like...), and we realized nothing would ever quite be the same. Two years later, we gather in person and online at 10 am on Sundays, and many if not most of our meetings and studies meet online (in three unique spaces live - YouTube for regular and ASL and Facebook - and throughout the week on those platforms). I was excited to hear (at the first of this year) that our Source Collaborative Team identified an online congregation as one of our three major initiatives in strategic planning to thrive in this new and in many ways uncharted landscape. To start, I wanted to identify Epworth members and friends who are part of our online congregation. This proved harder to do than I would have imagined. After months of sleuthing, I have a list of only 60 people, which includes folk on extended vacation (or work - or dealing with health issues) away or out of town on a Sunday and checking in, as well as regular online congregation members who live beyond commuting distance from Epworth. Only a fraction of us check in or participate in the chat (especially on YouTube, the platform of choice for most of our online congregation).

Here's the thing: the fact that identifying who our online congregation is (a relatively straightforward task with an in-person group) eludes us indicates that many of the aspects of this ministry will not fit the mold of our experience with what it means to be the church. Which does not mean we don't know anything about this ministry – or that nothing in the sanctuary applies online. Even before Covid, churches that offered online (worship) ministries typically assigned a <u>host to each online session</u> (great for live participants – and the host can also respond to comments pasted later). <u>Menti-meter/word wall</u> responses allow everyone <u>online and in person to join</u> <u>together</u> (so long as they're watching live).

So much of what we have already learned together online defies the boundaries and limitations we had come to accept about in person gatherings. Work Sunday mornings? Dave checks in from all over the country! Live in Ellicott City, Dover, or Wilmington? Jen, Kris, and Elle experience Epworth as their faith home in their living room. Vacationing in Italy, Florida, or wherever? Rick and Esther, and Dee and Linda kept connected when far away (and Linda even recorded a wonderful message in Florida about our paying off the mortgage that we played <u>during worship</u>). Who knows what else we will discover? I can't wait to find out with you!



April 30 – May 7, 14, 21 Come to Breakfast

Children will hear the story of Jesus' post-resurrection appearance to the disciples while they were fishing, discover that Jesus appeared to his followers after his resurrection, and learn that Jesus' death was not the end of the story! Bible Story: John 21:1-14; Bible Verse: They knew it was the Lord. John 21:12c; Anchor Point: Jesus is alive!

May 28 - June 4, 11, 18 Blessings and Birthrights

Children will hear the story of Jacob and Esau and learn that we can share God's love and bless others. Bible Story: Genesis 25:29-34; 27:1-46; Bible Verse: "The Lord bless you and keep you." (Numbers 6:24); Anchor Point: God blesses us.

June 25 – July 2, 9, 16 Ruth

Children will hear the story of Ruth and Naomi and discover ways to do what is good. Bible Story: The Book of Ruth; Bible Verse: "He has told you what is good and what the Lord requires from you: to do justice, embrace faithful love, and walk humbly with God." (Micah 6:8); Anchor Point: God helps me act in good ways.

July 23, 30 – August 6, 13 The Rainbow Promise

Children will hear the story of God's covenant with Noah and learn that we can trust God. Bible Story: Genesis 6:13-22; 7:1-16; 8:1-9:17; Bible Verse: God said to Noah, "This is the symbol of the covenant that I have set up between me and all creatures on earth." (Genesis 9:17); Anchor Point: We can trust God's promises.

August 20, 27 – September 3, 2023 The Lord's Prayer Children will hear the story of Jesus teaching the disciples to pray. Bible Story: Matthew 6:5-15; Bible Verse: Give us the bread we need for today. Matthew 6:11; Anchor Point: Jesus taught us how to pray.



Plastics are now not only clogging up our waters but also leaching


